

There is no way to challenge someone's right to vote on Election Day. Oklahoma law allows the appointment of "watchers" by parties or candidates, but they may only observe voting devices before and after voting, along with any repairs. They may NOT be present at the polling place while voting is taking place.

If you are registered, verify that the name and address on your registration are up to date. If not, make sure to update your information.

Oklahoma law requires either a valid (not expired), state-issued photo ID or a Voter Identification Card.

Your gender identity or gender presentation DOES NOT have to match your name, photo, or gender marker.

The name and address on your voter registration MUST match the name and address on your ID.

VOTE BY MAIL

Request an absentee ballot from the State your ballot in the mail a few weeks before Election Board website. You will receive notarized, and mail it in by the Friday the election. Just fill it out, get it

before the election.

HELPFUL HINTS

- Don't be surprised by something you didn't know was going to be on the ballot! Look at a sample ballot ahead of time and take your notes into the voting booth
- Sometimes voting lines are long, sometimes they're short. As long as you are in line to vote by 7 pm, you will be allowed to cast your ballot
- Bring a buddy! Check in with folks who may have trouble getting to the polls and give a ride to someone who may need one.

SPECIAL CIRCUMSTANCES

- You can request an absentee ballot
- College students must have their absentee ballots notarized
- Get your notarized ballot to the election board by 7 pm the day of the election

- address confidentiality. ACP voters have the right to vote AND maintain their
- ACP voters must fill out the ACP Voter Registration Packet and mail it to the State Election Board.
- will then forward the ballot to their confidential address. ACP voters are required to vote absentee. The ballot will be mailed to the ACP box. The Attorney General's office

ACP ballots must be notarized and received by the State Election Board no later than 7 pm on election day
